General Questions to Start the Discussion

1. What was your first reaction when you turned the last page?
2. How would you describe this book to a friend in one sentence?
3. What surprised you most as the story unfolded?
4. Which part stayed with you after you put the book down?
5. Did the book change how you think about anything?
6. What did the author do well, and where did the book fall short?
7. If you could ask the author one question, what would it be?
8. Would you recommend this book, and to whom?
9. What did you expect going in, and did the book deliver?
10. Which passage or line did you underline or want to reread?
11. How well did the title fit the story?
12. Using a scale you invent yourself, how would you rate it, and why?

Questions About the Author and Writing Style

1. What did you think of the author's writing style?
2. How did the author's choices shape the way you read the story?
3. Was the voice distinct, and did it fit the book?
4. What do you know about the author, and did it color your reading?
5. Did the writing ever pull you out of the story?
6. Which sentence or passage showed the author at their best?
7. How did the point of view affect what you knew and felt?
8. Would you read another book by this author, and why or why not?

Questions About the Characters

1. Which character did you connect with most, and why?
2. Which character frustrated you, and what did they get wrong?
3. Did the main character feel real and fully drawn?
4. How did the protagonist change from the first page to the last?
5. Whose choices did you question, and what would you have done instead?
6. Which relationship in the book felt the most true to life?
7. Did any character remind you of someone you know?
8. Who was the most underrated character, and why did they matter?
9. Did you trust the narrator? Should you have?
10. Which character would you most want to have coffee with?
11. Were the rivals or villains believable, or a little too simple?
12. If the story kept going, where would your favorite character end up?

Questions About the Plot and Pacing

1. Where did the story grab you, and where did it drag?

2. Did the twists surprise you, or did you see them coming?
3. Was the ending earned, or did it feel rushed?
4. Which scene would you cut, and which would you expand?
5. Did the book start in the right place?
6. How did the structure, the timeline, chapters, or points of view, shape your reading?
7. Was there a moment you almost stopped reading? What pulled you back?
8. Did any subplot deserve more room?
9. How did the author build and release tension?
10. If you rewrote the last chapter, what would change?

Questions About Themes and Messages

1. What was this book really about, underneath the plot?
2. Which themes did you notice, and which mattered most to you?
3. Did the book argue a point of view? Did you agree with it?
4. What questions did the book leave you sitting with?
5. How did the author handle the hardest subject in the book?
6. Did the message feel earned, or a little forced?
7. What would change if the story were set today, or fifty years ago?
8. Which theme will you still be thinking about next month?
9. Did the book challenge any belief you walked in with?
10. What do you think the author wanted you to feel by the end?

Questions About the Setting and World

1. How important was the setting to the story?
2. Could this book have happened anywhere else?
3. Did the world feel vivid, or did you want more detail?
4. What did the place reveal about the characters?
5. Would you want to visit the world of this book? Why or why not?
6. How did the time period shape the choices people made?
7. Which detail of the setting stuck with you?

Questions About the Beginning, Ending, and Title

1. Did the opening line or scene pull you in?
2. Looking back, what did the beginning quietly set up?
3. How did you feel as you read the final pages?
4. Did the ending answer your questions, or leave them open on purpose?
5. Would you have ended it differently?
6. What does the title mean to you now that you have finished?
7. Did the title give too much away, or just enough?
8. If you renamed the book, what would you call it?
9. Did the first and last lines speak to each other?
10. On reflection, was the ending hopeful, sad, or somewhere in between?

Questions That Connect the Book to Your Life

1. Did the book remind you of anything from your own life?

2. What would you have done in the main character's place?
3. Did the story shift your view on a real issue?
4. Which scene hit closest to home?
5. Has a book ever changed your thinking the way this one did?
6. What did you learn about yourself while reading?
7. Who in your life should read this next, and why?
8. Did the book make you want to do anything differently?
9. What memory did the story bring back?
10. How did your own background shape the way you read it?

Mystery and Thriller

1. When did you figure out the twist, and what tipped you off?
2. Did the author play fair with the clues?
3. Which red herring fooled you the most?
4. Was the villain's motive convincing?
5. Did the tension hold up on reflection, or only in the moment?
6. How satisfying was the final reveal?

Romance

1. Did the central relationship feel earned?
2. Which character grew the most through the love story?
3. Was the conflict keeping them apart believable?
4. Did the chemistry come through on the page?
5. How did the ending sit with you: a swoon, an eye-roll, or somewhere between?

Sci-Fi and Fantasy

1. How well did the world-building hold together?
2. Did the rules of the world stay consistent?
3. What real-world idea was the story really exploring?
4. Which invention or piece of magic would you want to be real?
5. Did the stakes feel big enough?
6. Where did the author's imagination impress you most?

Historical Fiction

1. How well did the book bring its era to life?
2. What did you learn about the period?
3. Where do you think the author blended fact and invention?
4. Did the characters feel true to their time?
5. Did the history ever overwhelm the story, or did it serve it?

General Nonfiction

1. What was the author's main argument, and were you convinced?
2. How strong was the evidence behind the biggest claims?
3. What did you learn that you did not know before?
4. Did the author leave out a perspective you wanted to hear?

5. How did the structure help or hurt the argument?
6. Will this book change anything you do?
7. Who needs to read this, and why?

Memoir and Biography

1. Whose story is being told, and whose voice is missing?
2. How honest did the author feel on the page?
3. Which moment revealed the most about this person?
4. How did the subject change over the course of the book?
5. Did knowing the story is true change how you read it?
6. What would you ask this person if you had the chance?
7. How did the author handle the hardest chapters of their life?

Self-Help and Business

1. What is the single idea you will actually try?
2. Did the advice feel grounded, or a little thin?
3. Which example or case study stuck with you?
4. Where does this book's advice not apply?
5. Did the author practice what they preach?
6. How would you sum up the whole book in one takeaway?
